Statement of facts:

I am reporting what I believe to be campaign finance reporting violations by Franklin D. Kluesner, the current Sheriff of Beaverhead County who is running for re-election in the November 2018 general election.

During the Month of May, Kluesner for Sheriff campaign signs began appearing in and about Dillon. These appear to be the same campaign signs used in his 2014 campaign for Sheriff and may be being recycled. On May 29th, I took the attached picture of one of his signs, posted on Montana Highway 91 North approximately 5 miles from the Dillon city limits. I have observed approximately 40 to 50 such signs in and around Dillon and in the outlying areas of the Beaverhead County. It has been two reporting cycles and the Kluesner campaign has failed to include the cost of any signs on his financial reports, or, if they are recycled signs, the donation of the signs from his 2014 campaign to his 2018 campaign.

For the entire reporting cycle from March 9, 2018 to May 6, 2018, Frank Kluesner's finance report filed on May 6, 2018, indicated he had no income and no expenditures during the course of his campaign up to that point, and does not show any money in a bank account. On June 25, 2018, after the third finance report deadline, he did amend the first campaign report to indicate he had, in fact, paid his filing fee of \$231.49, but still showed no income into his campaign to pay this fee from any source, including in-kind contributions. As of this date, the Amended campaign report still shows no income received, in-kind or donated, to pay for the campaign fee. His May 7, 2018 to May 24, 2018 campaign report has no income or expenses reported. His May 25, 2018 to June 23, 2018 campaign report does show some income, but it also shows the purchase of t-posts for signs from Rocky Mountain Supply, but no expense for signs.

I believe the failure to accurately report income and expenses on his first financial report and his total failure to report any expenses or in-kind contributions for his signs, to be a violation of the finance reporting laws found in Montana Code Annotated §13-37-225 and §13-37-226, especially in light of the recent Missoulian article 'Commissioner finds Missoula sheriff violated campaign finance laws', June 1, 2018.

Just prior to July 27, 2018, Kluesner delivered the enclosed letter to member of the press in Butte and Dillon. The letter contains a statement about his years of service in law enforcement and his hope that the voters will give him a second term. In reading the letter, it contains information in regards to a recent controversy over the firing of a Beaverhead County Deputy, however, also provides significant commentary regarding the political fodder this firing gave to his political opponents. I note that the letterhead that was used for this "MEDIA STATEMENT" contains the words "RE-ELECT" and the letter concludes with www.kluesnerforsheriff.com I believe this is clearly a campaign letter and fails to include an attribution as defined in §13-35-225, MCA, and is in violation of the campaign reporting laws. I have also enclosed a copy of the article as it was posted in the newspaper and a follow-up that was done by the Dillon Tribune.


