Tell him to stop HR1505, and stop the federal land grab.</p> <p>Paid for by Citizens for Strength and Security Fund.</p>	<p>HR 1505 would give DHS control over public land within 100 miles of land or maritime US border, including "nearly the entire northern third" of Montana</p> <p>According to the Congressional Research Service summary, HR 1505 would give the Department of Homeland Security control of all federal lands within 100 miles of any land or maritime border of the United States. [CRS Summary for HR.1505]</p> <p>According to the Great Falls Tribune, the "controversial" bill "would give the Department of Homeland Security unprecedented authority over federal lands within 100 miles of the United States' border." [Great Falls Tribune, 9/19/11, http://bit.ly/Ad69RS]</p> <p>"The bill would give the secretary of homeland security total operational authority over all federal lands within 100 miles of the U.S. international and maritime borders. [Great Falls Tribune, 9/19/11, http://bit.ly/Ad69RS]</p> <p>Including most of northern third of Montana</p> <p>"In Montana, the law would impact nearly the entire northern third of the state, including Glacier National Park; portions of the Kootenai and Flathead national forests; The Flathead, Blackfeet, Rocky Boy's, Fort Belknap and Fort Peck Indian reservations, the Upper Missouri River Breaks National Monument, the Charles M. Russell National Wildlife Refuge, and tens of thousands of acres of Bureau of Land Management lands." [Great Falls Tribune, 9/19/11, http://bit.ly/Ad69RS]</p> <p>HR 1505 would give Homeland Security ability to fence of public land</p> <p>Section (2)(b)(1) of HR 1505 gives the Homeland Security Department "immediate access" to federal public lands for: "(A) Construction and maintenance of roads. (B) Construction and maintenance of fences. (C) Use vehicles to patrol. (D) Installation, maintenance, and operation of surveillance equipment and sensors. (E) Use of aircraft. (F) Deployment of temporary tactical infrastructure, including forward operating bases." [HR 1505, introduced 4/13/11]</p>

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<p>Dennis Rehberg voted for the Patriot Act, and supported Real ID.</p>	<p>Rehberg supported the original Patriot Act.</p> <p>In 2001, Rehberg voted in favor of the Patriot Act, which expanded law enforcement's power to investigate suspected terrorists. Among many provisions, the bill: Allowed disclosure of wiretap information among certain government officials, authorize limited disclosure of secret grand jury information to certain government officials, and authorize the Attorney General to detain foreigners suspected of ties to terrorism; Expanded the number of crimes considered terrorist acts and increases the punishment for committing them; Allowed nationwide jurisdiction for search warrants and electronic surveillance devices, including legal expansion of those devices to e-mail and Internet; Authorized the use of roving wiretaps, in which officials get orders that allow them to tap whatever telephone a person uses instead of one telephone at a time; Relaxed rules to allow the FBI and intelligence officials to share grand jury and wiretap information more easily. The bill passed 357-66 [Vote #398, 10/24/2001; AP, 10/25/01]</p> <p>Rehberg Supported REAL ID Bill Toughening Driver's License Standards</p> <p>In 2005, Rehberg voted in favor of final passage of a bill to virtually bar states from issuing driver's licenses to illegal immigrants, tighten the rules for asylum and close a hole in the border fence between California and Mexico. The bill would require states to verify that any driver's license applicant was residing legally in the U.S. before issuing a license that could be used for purposes of federal identification. That would mean states could issue licenses to illegal immigrants—as 11 states now do—but those licenses could not be used to board airplanes in the United States, open bank accounts or enter federal buildings. The legislation would also increase the burden of proof that applicants for asylum must meet and would restrict the right of judges to review decisions by immigration officials at the borders to reject asylum applications. [HR 1505, Introduced 4/13/11]</p> <p>Rehberg took credit for changes in the bill and was praised for his changes by primary sponsor of the bill</p> <p>According to a press release written by Rehberg, HR 1505 "s was a good bill, and now it's even better." He lauded the House Natural Resources Committee for "including many changes that he proposed" in the amended version approved for floor action by the Committee.</p> <p>The primary sponsor of the bill, Utah Republican Rob Bishop, is quoted in Rehberg's release, praising Rehberg's "insightful recommendations." Said Bishop, "Congressman Rehberg was exceptionally helpful to our efforts to make adjustments and improvements to the bill."
