7 legislative candidates disqualified from Montana ballot

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Six state House candidates and a Senate candidate have been disqualified from this year's elections because they failed to submit business disclosure statements.

Four Republican were disqualified as House candidates: Richard Fife II of Butte, Michael Bruner of Butte, Suzzann Nordwick of Butte and Berthold Stumberg of East Helena.

Their removal leaves no challengers to the Democratic candidates for the four House seats. One, House District 74, is an open seat.

Montana law requires all candidates to turn in disclosure statements to the commissioner of political practices within five days of filing for office.

Commissioner Jeff Mangan notified Secretary of State Corey Stapleton Monday of the delinquent filers.

Libertarian House candidate Ron Vandevender of Cascade was removed, as was Libertarian Senate candidate Carol Kent of Missoula.

One Democrat, House candidate Riley Wisler of Billings, was also removed.

Nine candidates disqualified from Montana's primary election ballot

Nine candidates have been disqualified from Montana's June primary ballot for failing to file required campaign finance documents.

Two State Auditor candidates – Steve Gunderson and Keith Brownfield, Al Dunlap, a candidate for the Public Service Commission District 4, Christian Daniel Takesenemy (Senate District 21), Colleen Schmeling (House District 51), Lui Salina (House District 25), Joshua Rosales (House District 21),), Annie Leatherbarrow (House District 24), , and Kenneth Allen (House District 86) have their names removed from the ballot. Montana law requires candidates to file documents on campaign finance information and business interests within five days of filing for office.

Commissioner of Political Practices Chris Gallus notified the Secretary of State's office Wednesday. A spokesperson for the Secretary of State confirmed to MTPR the office had received the list and would remove the candidates ahead of certifying the primary ballot.

TITLE 13. ELECTIONS
CHAPTER 37. CONTROL OF CAMPAIGN PRACTICES
Part 2. Campaign Finance

Campaign Treasurer

- **13-37-201.** Campaign treasurer. (1) Except as provided in <u>13-37-206</u>, each candidate, each political committee, and each joint fundraising committee shall appoint one campaign treasurer and certify the full name and complete address of the campaign treasurer pursuant to this section.
 - (2) (a) A candidate shall file the certification within 5 days after becoming a candidate.
- (b) Except as provided in subsection (2)(c), a political committee and a joint fundraising committee shall file the certification, which must include an organizational statement and the name and address of all officers, if any, within 5 days after it makes an expenditure or authorizes another person to make an expenditure on its behalf, whichever occurs first. A joint fundraising committee shall also provide a list of participants with the certification.
- (c) A political committee that is seeking to place a ballot issue before the electors shall file the certification, including the information required in subsection (2)(b), within 5 days after the proposed issue is submitted to the secretary of state under 13-27-214.
- (3) The certification of a candidate, political committee, or joint fundraising committee must be filed with the commissioner.
